in addition to the catered contributions. There potluck was a contest for the best Birthday Cake for Buddha. Lucky number drawings were held for the youngsters, tickets to the local movie theater and a gift certificate at a pizza restaurant. In addition, there was a silent auction for items donated, the purpose of which was to raise money to support five Ukrainian families.

Combined with donations, the temple was able to raise over \$3,000 which was quickly dis-

tributed directly to the families via Moneygram.
